# A View from the Eyes of a Twin

As twins, my brother and I have grown up and experienced life together. We have been inseparable, best of friends for twenty-five years... we celebrate together – birthdays, holidays, and achievements – and we support each other through the tough times and challenges...Recently, beginning early in the new year of 2008, I witnessed my brother going through some of the hardest times yet – loss of eyesight and together with family and friends we prayed, laughed, prayed some more, and hoped for the best results as Benjamin underwent cornea transplant surgery in hopes of eye-sight restoration.

Late in 2007, Benjamin began struggling with his eyesight. As the weeks continued to pass by, his eyesight continued to degenerate. Eventually, after doctoring with a local optometrist, he was referred on to Doctor Andrew Moyes in Kansas City, Missouri. After an initial consultation and examination, Benjamin was diagnosed with karataconus. Karataconus means that my corneas are shaped like cones instead of ovals. So it creates a blurry, almost blinding affect based on how bad you have it

Initially treated with various hard contacts, Benjamin's eyes did not respond...At the next appointment, Benjamin underwent another examination that determined that the worst-possible had happened – his eyesight had continued to degenerate at an extensive degree. Surgery

was inevitable; he needed cornea transplants.

Thus it was set and scheduled - in February, 2008 Benjamin would get his right cornea replaced and the left was scheduled for December of 2008.

The right-eye cornea transplant was a success! Dr. Moyes was pleased and all seemed well... Suddenly though, one month into recover, Benjamin began facing difficulties – two of the twenty-four stitches in his eye had become infected; in addition, had a rejection line across the top part of the cornea. Immediately intense treatment of extensive drops, ointment, and a lot of prayers began; thankfully his body again accepted the cornea and has continued to do so. He currently sees 20/25 vision with a -3 stigmatism wearing a contact – a 100% improvement from the year prior.

In October Dr. Moyes began planning for the second transplant, and on December 14, Benjamin had his left eye cornea transplant. It was, again, a successful surgery; there was no reason to fear another infection or rejection. Suddenly one morning, though, Benjamin woke up not seeing out of the eye. A rejection line had formed over the line-of-vision. Once again, the intensive treatment program began again and, currently, everything is back in the clear - pun intended!!

As he continues to recover, Benjamin has 14 stitches in his right eye and 24 in the

left - some of the stitches will stay in the eye for up to four years. He will have to continuously put drops in his eyes and also has to be extremely careful to avoid being hit in the head and eye.

And with these new experiences and blessings we continue to celebrate and live with gratitude, praying for continued success and good health... Daily I am reminded to appreciate the basic gifts and functions of life – good health, eyesight, food, shelter, a home – because I remember the day when my twin, Benjamin, woke up and realized that he may not ever see clearly again.

A note from Benjamin:---

First off, I would like to thank my sister for writing this article. Second, I would like to thank my family and friends for the support and prayers through my procedures. Also, I would like to thank Maryville Host and Pride Lions for their donations and support. And finally, I want to tell the everyone involved with the Missouri Lions Eye Research Foundation how sincerely grateful I am for what you do for people with eye problems. Without all the time and energy the Lions put in every day, sight would be impossible for so many people.

# Auxvasse Lions continue support for City Park.

The Auxvasse Lions Club made a donation of \$4500 to the city of Auxvasse for the new pavilion that has been erected in the city park. This is the second donation the Lions have made totaling \$9500 toward the price of the pavilion. The Lions built the original pavilion in the city park in 1960 and this building served the community for 47 years. Last summer the Auxvasse City council decided the pavilion should be replaced and the Lions stepped forward and volunteered to pay for the new pavilion over a three year period.

The club took on the project of raising funds to purchase land for a city park in 1957. All of the money for the purchase price of \$1750 was from donations and the Lions were the largest contributor with \$500. The club also made a considerable sized donation on the scout house in the park and helped with its construction. It has also helped pay the utilities for the scout

house since the building was constructed and has been the sponsoring organization for the scouts in Auxvasse since 1968.

In 1980, Lion Dr. A H Domann was murdered and the community renamed the Auxvasse City Park as Dr. A H Domann Memorial Park. Lion Domann was a charter member of the Auxvasse Lions Club and had perfect attendance for 30 years at the time of his death.

The club has had many other projects through the years to help the com-

munity. "The Lions Club is proud of the projects we undertaken to help the city and we are especially proud of the part we played in the formation of the park and the pavilion" said Lion President Betty Knipp. She also said the club will con-

tinue to look for ways to serve the community in the same way it has with the pavilion in the park.

### PROPOSITION NO. 1

A RESOLUTION CORRECTING THE REFERENCED SECTIONS AND SPECIFICALLY DESIGNATING THE COUNCIL CHAIRPERSON AS A VOTING MEMBER OF THE COUNCIL. THIS IS REQUIRED BY LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL.


## SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article II, Section 1 (b) and Article V, Sections 2 (a) and 2 (d) of the Constitution of Multiple District 26 be amended to read as follows:

**Section 1 (b)** "Council XE "Council" " or "State Council", shall refer to the Council of Governors whose voting members shall be each District Governor XE "District Governor" of the Districts in Multiple District No. 26 and the Council Chairperson.

Section 2 (a) There shall be a Council XE "Council" comprised of all of the District Governor XE "District Governor" s in Multiple District No. 26 and the State Secretary XE "State Secretary" -Treasurer who shall be an ex-officio member without a vote XE "vote". Each Council XE "Council" of Governors shall elect a chairperson XE "Council Chairman" and a vice chairperson, who shall be elected at a special meeting XE "special meeting" of the incoming governors to be held prior to the International Convention XE "International Convention". The chairperson XE "Council Chairman" must have been a member of the outgoing council. The outgoing council shall, prior to the special meeting XE "special meeting" of the incoming council, recommend two or more of their members as candidates for chairperson, but the incoming council is not limited to those recommendations in making their choice. In the event no member of the outgoing council is willing to serve as chairperson, the incoming council shall elect its chairperson from the next preceding council. The duties XE "duties" of the chairperson XE "Council Chairman" shall be to chair all meetings of the council and convention XE "convention", to set the agenda of all meetings subject to the approval of the Governors, to represent Multiple District 26 at all appropriate functions and events within the state, to further the Purpose and Objects of this Association, to provide leadership, direction, and initiative for International and Multiple District programs, goals, and long range planning, to create and foster harmony and unity among Sub-Districts, and assist District Governor XE "District Governor" s to solve issues, to submit reports and perform such duties as may be required by the Multiple District Constitution and By-Laws XE "Constitution and By-Laws", to perform such other administrative duties as may be assigned by the Council XE "Council", and facilitate, at the close of his/her term XE "term" of office XE "term of office", the timely presentation of all Multiple District accounts XE "accounts", funds, and records XE "records" to his/her successor in office. Expenses shall be governed by rules of audit for district governors. The Council Chairperson shall be a voting member of the Council. The Chairperson shall be an ex-officio member of all Multiple District 26 committees, but shall have no vote in any of the committees. The vice chairperson XE "Vice Chairman" shall be elected by the incoming Council XE "Council" from its own members. The Vice Chairperson shall perform the duties XE "duties" of Chairperson in the absence of the Chairperson.

**Section 2 (d)** Each member of the council of governors, including the council chairperson, shall have one (1) vote on each question requiring action of the Council of Governors. A majority of the voting members of the Council XE "Council" shall constitute a quorum XE "quorum" thereof. Unless otherwise specified herein, to pass any motions brought before the Council at a duly held



meeting thereof, it shall only require an affirmative vote XE "vote" of a majority of the <del>District</del> Governor S Council members present and voting on the issue.

## PROPOSITION NO. 2

A RESOLUTION REMOVING THE RIGHTS OF THE VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR, REPRESENTING AN ABSENT DISTRICT GOVERNOR AT A COUNCIL MEETING, TO VOTE AT SAID COUNCIL MEETING. CURRENT WORDING IS IN VIOLATION OF CURRENT LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

#### SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article V, Section 1(h) of the Constitution of Multiple District 26 be amended to read as follows:

**(h)** The Vice District Governor shall represent the District Governor at the State Council Meetings in case of the absence of the District Governor. and when doing so shall have full voting rights.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3

A RESOLUTION CLARIFYING THAT THE DISTRICT GOVERNOR MAY APPOINT MORE THAN ONE MEMBER TO EACH STATE COMMITTEE, BUT EACH DISTRICT REPRESENTED WILL ONLY BE ALLOWED ONE VOTE.

#### SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article VI, Section 2 and Section 10 of the Constitution of Multiple District 26 be amended to read as follows:

**Section 2** TC "Composition" \f C \l "2" . Except as otherwise provided in this Constitution or the By-Laws of this Multiple District No. 26, each State committee shall consist of at least one member appointed to represent each District by the District Governor XE "District Governor" representing said District at the time the appointment is made. <u>Districts will be allowed only one vote from among it's representatives at any committee meeting.</u>

**Section 10**. A majority of the Committee members Districts present at a committee meeting shall constitute a quorum XE "quorum". Except as otherwise specifically required, it shall only take a vote XE "vote" of a majority of the Districts those committee members present and voting to pass any matter brought before the committee at a duly held meeting thereof.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4

A RESOLUTION ADDING THAT THE LIONS OPPORTUNITY FOR YOUTH COMMITTEE WILL OPERATE ON THE SAME TERM OF OFFICE AS THE ATHLETIC, ALL-STATE BAND AND CONVENTION COMMITTEES.

#### SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article VI, Section 4 of the Constitution of Multiple District 26 be amended to read as follows:

**Section 4**. Except as otherwise provided in this Article, the term TC "Term of Office" \f C \l "2" XE "term of office" of each committee member shall expire at the expiration of the term of the Council XE "Council" during which said member is appointed. The terms of office of members of the Athletic, All-State Band, Lions Opportunities for Youth and Convention Committees shall be and said Committees shall operate on a year of October 1 to September 30 of the following year, both dates inclusive.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5

A RESOLUTION ADDING THE LONG RANGE PLANNING COMMITTEE AS AN APPOINTED STATE COMMITTEE.

#### SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article VI, Section 6 (r) of the Constitution of Multiple District 26 be added and Article VI, Section 8 (a) and 8(b) and 8 (c) be amended to read as follows:

**Section 6**. **(r)** Long Range Planning Committee ---- At the direction of the Council, it shall be the duty of this Committee to carefully examine any and all aspects of Lionism in the State and make recommendations to the Council to improve the operations, policy and impact of Lionism in the Multiple District. Past International Directors, if not District representatives, shall be ex-officio non-voting members of the committee. State and International Lions' employees can and should be consulted. The committee may, at its discretion, consult with as many additional Lions as it deems necessary.

# **Section 8**. Terms and Appointments

- (a) The following State Committees shall have a TC "Committees with Two Year Terms" \f C \l "2" two year term:
  - (1) State Convention XE "State Convention"
  - (2) Sight Conservation and Work with the Blind
  - (3) Lions Business Opportunities for the Missouri Blind XE "Lions Business Opportunities for the Missouri Blind"
  - (4) Public Relations XE "Public Relations"
  - (5) Hearing Conservation and Work with the Deaf
  - (6) Constitution and By-Laws
  - (7) Long Range Planning XE "Constitution and By-Laws"
- **(b)** For Council terms commencing in even years, appointments to the above mentioned committees shall be as follows:

State Convention XE "State Convention" --- M2, M4 and M6.

Sight Conservation and Work with the Blind--- M2, M4 and M6.

Lions Business Opportunities for the Missouri Blind XE "Lions Business Opportunities for the

Missouri Blind" --- M2, M4 and M6.

Public Relations XE "Public Relations" --- M2, M4 and M6.

Hearing Conservation and Work with the Deaf---M2, M4 and M6.

Constitution and By-Laws XE "Constitution and By-Laws" --- M2, M4 and M6

Long Range Planning--- M2, M4 and M6.

**(c)** For Council terms commencing in odd years, appointments to the above mentioned committees shall be as follows:

State Convention XE "State Convention" --- M1, M3, M5 and M7.

Sight Conservation and Work with the Blind--- M1, M3, M5 and M7.

Lions Business Opportunities for the Missouri Blind XE "Lions Business Opportunities for the Missouri Blind" ---M1, M3, M5 and M7.

Public Relations XE "Public Relations" ----M1, M3, M5 and M7.

Hearing Conservation and Work with the Deaf---M1, M3, M5 and M7.

Constitution and By-Laws XE "Constitution and By-Laws" --- M1, M3, M5 and M7.

Long Range Planning--- M1, M3 M5 and M7.

### PROPOSITION NO. 6

A RESOLUTION ALLOWING SPECIFYING THAT STATE COMMITTEES MAY APPOINT ADDITIONAL NON-VOTING ADVISORS TO ASSIST THEM.

#### SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article VI, Section 11 of the Constitution of Multiple District 26 be amended to read as follows:

**Section 11**. In addition to the basic membership XE "membership" of the Committee, the Council XE "Council" of Governors may appoint additional persons to serve as ex-officio non-voting members. In addition to the members appointed by the District Governors, a committee may itself appoint advisors to help carry out its charge. Advisors are not entitled to vote. Advisors are not entitled to reimbursements for mileage expenses without prior approval by the Council.

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7

A RESOLUTION SPECIFICALLY PROHIBITING PROXY VOTING IN ALL MULTIPLE DISTRICT BUSINESS, INCLUDING COUNCIL AND COMMITTEE MEETINGS. THIS IS REQUIRED BY LIONS CLUBS INTERNATIONAL.

#### SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article XI, Section 3 of the Constitution of Multiple District 26 be added to read as follows:

**Section 3.** Proxy voting is strictly prohibited in all multiple district affairs, including Council and committee meetings.

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 8**

A RESOLUTION REQUIRING STATE COMMITTEES TO SUBMIT WITHIN 30 DAYS AFTER THE ANNUAL STATE CONVENTION A PRELIMINARY ADMINISTRATIVE BUDGET FOR THE FOLLOWING TERM. THIS IS TO FACILITATE THE INCOMING COUNCIL'S BUDGET DEVELOPMENT PLANNING MEETING.

#### SHALL THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BE ADOPTED?

BE IT RESOLVED, that Article II, Section 6 of the By-Laws of Multiple District 26 be added to read as follows:

**Section 6.** All state-wide committees shall prepare and file with the State Council a preliminary administrative budget, including expected revenues and expenditures of their operations for the upcoming Council term, within thirty (30) days after the annual State Convention.

# William C. Chandler Youth Camp - over this year 2008

The William C. Chandler Youth Camp for the 2008 year was just completed. We had 20 youth in our camp this year. They spend 10 days in St. Louis with host families and 10 days in Lake of the Ozark, Jefferson City area with host families and after that time, they went to Camp Brimshire in St. James, Missouri for one week before going back to St. Louis with original host families for one or two days till returning home to their prospective countries. The students were from many countries, Mongolia, Finland, Denmark, Germany, Ukraine, Holland, Austria, Italy, Turkey and Brazil. They were a great bunch of students.

The Youth Camp has been in existence since 1980 and started in St. louis area. The mission statement for our camp was "To foster International understanding among the youth of the World." It was only in St. Louis till the Opportunities for Youth Committee was formed and we tried to make it a statewide youth camp in 2001. We had Lions hosting students in Jefferson City, Springfield, Kansas City and St.

Louis. The Springfield and Kansas City areas decided not to participate anymore and it now is only in the St. Louis and Jefferson City/Lake of the Ozark areas now. We wish we could get the other areas of the state to participate again but the camp is still going strong. The host families from these areas still involved have taken the students to see many and participated in many fun tours and they have seen many landmarks and places of interest in many areas of the state.

Another aspect of the Youth Exchange Program is our Multiple District 26 sending students over to Europe, Asia, South America and etc. There are many camps run just like ours and we would be thrilled to have some of our students going over to other countries. We had four students going to other countries this year, one to Italy, one to Holland, one to Brazil and one to Austria. They are all back now and had a wonderful experience. It is unfortunate that we don't take advantage of this program more. The students have to be 16-21 years old and there is no language require-

ments. The only cost to the students is their round trip flight over to the country they want to visit. Once over there, they are hosted by families and go to camp just like ours.

MD26-Missouri, USA is the only camp in Missouri recognized by Lions International and it is in their list of camps online. Anyone can look this up. Go to International Association of Lions Club, the go to the Youth Camp Icon and pull up Youth Camps around the world.

# Changing the World Through the Gift of Sight

Something as simple as an old pair of glasses can lift someone out of poverty – and change the well-being of an entire village.

This January, the Missouri Lions Eye Research Foundation contributed 2,750 used eyeglasses to the Himalayan Cataract Project (HCP), www.cureblindness.org, which works to eradicate preventable and curable blindness in impoverished areas.

As part of the Millennium Villages Project, the HCP will travel to Africa in April and June to screen villagers, provide treatment for a variety of eye conditions and distribute the eyeglasses.

According to Dr. Matt Oliva, corneal specialist at the Medical Eye Center in Medford, Ore., HCP board member, and associate medical director of SightLife, the

donated glasses lift a burden off HCP. "It's a huge benefit financially for us," said Dr. Oliva. "We can treat a larger number of people at a lower cost."

While preventing and treating eye disease in developed countries is crucial, in sub-Saharan Africa, it can be the tipping point for survival. When someone is affected by blindness, he or she can't perform vital jobs and often requires assistance from a family member who could be working for the betterment of the overall community.

Remarked Dr. Oliva, "Once we restore sight to someone again, it can make a huge impact on that person's life, his or her family's life and the community at large. Even something as simple as a pair of reading glasses can make a big difference for someone. It might be something we take for granted, but it allows someone to cook, perform fine handiwork and contribute to society."

# A Chance Encounter Improves a Child's Eyesight

During a back-to-school event in Shelbina, Mo. in August 2008, Mendy Schaefer and her three-year-old daughter, Hayden, were walking by the Missouri Lions Eye Research

An amblyopia screening helped improve Hayden's eyesight.

Foundation vision screening booth when a Lion invited the little girl to be screened. Those few moments made a significant impact on Hayden's eye health.

The test found Hayden to be afflicted with a visual abnormality. After a visit to the eye doctor, Hayden was diagnosed with amblyopia and farsightedness, both problematic conditions that are now being treated through prescription eyeglasses.

Mendy was blown away by the diagnosis. "I teach preschool and normally catch these things in my students. My daughter gave me no signs. I had no idea there was a problem."

Although this energetic preschooler never voiced a problem with her eyesight before the screening, she did after just one week in glasses. Said Mendy, "One night we

were sitting in front of the T.V. watching cartoons. Since it was almost time for bed, we had taken Hayden's glasses off. Right away she wanted them back on because the T.V. was, 'fuzzy – like before I got glasses.'"

Today, Mendy continues to recommend the free Lions eye screenings to other parents.

## **Foundation 2008 Stats**

- As of November 30, 2008, 283 Missouri residents received cornea transplants
- 563 people were tested for glaucoma 20 were referred to specialists for treatment

# Five Fast Facts on Eyeglass Recycling

As you have read about Dr. Oliva's upcoming visit to Africa, recycled eyeglasses are in high demand. Thanks to Missouri Lions, more than 80,000 pairs of glasses are received and distributed in developing countries each year.

- 1. The Foundation accepts all types of eyeglasses, not just prescription specs. Whether you have single vision glasses, bifocals, readers, prescription and nonprescription sunglasses, or children's eyeglasses, please send them our way. Eyeglasses with either plastic or metal frames are accepted, although the metal frames will be recycled as opposed to being reused. Unfortunately, we cannot accept frames without lenses, lenses without frames or eyeglass cases at this time.
- **2.** The Foundation strives to make drop-offs as easy as possible. If you have a large collection of glasses, we encourage you to drop them off at our headquarters in Columbia, Mo. However, each of our branch offices in St. Louis, Kansas City, Joplin and Springfield, Mo. and Springfield, Ill. will accept eyeglass drop-offs as well.
- **3. There's more than one way to help the Foundation's eyeglass recycling program.** All donations we receive must be sorted and divided by eyeglass type before being stored or shipped. This work is handled mainly by our wonderful volunteers. A sorting party at our Columbia headquarters is a great way to spend a few hours with your fellow Lions and continue to help those in need. And as always, the Foundation will accept a financial donation to help us in our mission.
- **4. Eyeglass donations are delivered around the world.** Because the majority of donations we receive are prescription glasses, government regulations do not permit us to distribute used glasses in the U.S. Only a medical doctor can provide an individual with prescription glasses and only after an eye examination. Developing countries do not have these restrictions, which allow mission groups to work with local eye care providers in those areas and distribute eyeglasses.
- **5.** There are eyeglasses ready for medical mission groups right now. If you know of a group that needs recycled eyeglasses for a mission trip, call the Foundation public relations department at 800-283-1982, ext. 107. We can connect an organization to the types and volume of eyeglasses it needs.

# Missouri Lions All-Star Football Game on track for 2009

The 33rd Annual Missouri Lions All-Star Football Game will be held July 18th 2009 on the University of Central Missouri campus in Warrensburg. The Athletic Committee has already completed the bulk of the planning for this year's game with only a few details yet to be finalized.

Our Coaches will be Matt Smith from 2008 Class 2 State Champion Clark County High School guiding the Gold team and Billy Webber from 2008 Class 1 2nd place Thayer High School will take the reins for the Purple Team. We are very excited about the experience, knowledge, morals, and outstanding positive attitude both coaches will be bringing to our project. We have no doubt that they will set forth an atmosphere that will provide an unforgettable experience for all the players and fans.

Player selections were done very differently this year. In the past the team they were on was determined geographically. This year we conducted a draft and geography only played a part in maintaining a balance of players from all areas of the state. The Coaches took turns in picking players. Therefore we no longer have an East and a West team. Instead we have Purple & Gold teams. This was done to create more interaction amongst all the players as well as keep the teams closely matched talent wise making for a better overall experience for all. The initial player selections have been made and the confirmation of each player's commitment to play process is under way. Once the rosters are finalized we will put out a State-wide press release. We have selected 70 players out of the 160 nominations we received and they will be representing approximately 60 different High Schools. The game will showcase these top High School senior players

from all over the State.

The players will report for camp on July 12th and spend the week practicing for the game as well as being involved in other life enrichment, educational and community service activities throughout the week followed by a banquet to honor the players, coaches and their families on Friday evening the 17th.

This Statewide project is probably one of our most unique, in that it is a life enrichment/ opportunities for youth project for the players, a fundraiser for the Missouri Lions Eye Research Foundation, a Missouri Lions public awareness event as well as a venue for the young athletes to be seen by college scouts creating opportunities for them to secure scholarships to further their educations all of which fall within our motto of "We Serve". With that being said the success of this project can't be measured in the amount of monetary profit alone. The overall positive impact is well above and beyond the measurable profits and is truly limitless.

This project is funded primarily through ad sales for the souvenir program book that is made available at the game. Ad prices will be the same as they have been for several years. The typical process is that the local Lions Club(s) from each player's area sell ads to the local business and individuals in the area. This not only raises public awareness of the local Club's interest and involvement in youth activities but, is also a good way to seek out potential new Lions. It will require \$750.00 in ad sales per player to meet the basic needs and goals this year.

I challenge each Club that has a player from their local or area school to step up and make the commitment to sell at least the \$750.00 in ads needed

to cover the expenses of that player and all other Clubs at a minimum purchase a minimum size ad at a price of \$35.00. If this happens we will without a doubt have the most successful game in its 33 year history. I honestly feel that \$35.00 is a pretty modest request from each Club that they all should be able to easily do once a year. Just a \$1-\$5 "pass the hat" donation from each member in your club will do the trick to raise the \$35.00 or more for an ad in the program. It is imperative that all ad sales be submitted to the District Chair for proper processing. The support from Lions Clubs increased dramatically last year and I personally thank each of you that were involved

This project has always held the ability to be one of the most notable Lions Club projects in the Nation and even the World. But, to be truly perpetually successful and ever-improving it needs the continual support of all Missouri Lions. All I am asking is that all of you please realize the true value of this project and buy into its worth by supporting it in any way you have the means to facilitate and help us reach our ultimate goal of every Club in the state buying an ad.

The new football game pins will be available soon for all you pin collectors. Contact myself, your District Athletic Chair, the State Office or stop by our table at the State Convention to purchase an ad, a pin, game tickets, banquet tickets, receive ad sales supplies or for any questions you may have. I also encourage each of you to attend the game, as it truly is an enjoyable experience that you will not soon forget.
