Proposition 2. Correct By-Laws to reflect guidance in other State Documents and Practices

It is proposed that the Assistant Secretary-Treasurer be added to the By-Laws of Lions Multiple District 26 of the State of Missouri, Article 1, Section 2, as one of four authorized signers of checks.

By-Laws, Article 1, Section 2. (p. 15)

Section 2. State Council. The State Council approve all bills relating to the State Funds. Checks drawn against the State Funds shall be signed by two of the following three Council four authorized Officers: Council Chairman, Council Vice Chairman, Assistant Secretary-Treasurer, and Council Secretary-Treasurer.

Proposition 3. Provide alternative procedure for signing/counter-signing checks drawn against State Funds.

It is proposed that a new paragraph be added to the By-Laws of Lions Multiple District 26 of the State of Missouri, Article 1, Section 2, to provide for alternative (Office Committee) individuals authorized to sign/counter-sign checks drawn against State Funds.

By-Laws, Article 1, Section 2. (p. 15)

Section 2. State Council. The State Council is the deliberative and assisting body in the formulation of administrative plans and policies affecting the State, including the annual State Convention. It shall make all contracts and approve all bills relating to the State Funds. Checks drawn against the State Funds shall be signed by two of the following three Council Officers: Council Chairman, Council Vice Chairman, and Council Secretary-Treasurer.

Alternatively, in event securing a second signature from any of the above creates sizeable expenses and/or delays, a member of the State Office Committee may be empowered by the council to sign checks. In event such authority is granted, a procedure shall be established in which the secretary-treasurer shall fully inform the assistant secretary-treasurer, council chairperson, and vice-council chairperson, of the checks to be signed, and receive approval of the expenditure from at least one of the foregoing before the second signature may be affixed. Authorization by electronic means shall suffice.

The Council shall designate a depository for said funds and set the amount of corporate surety bond for the Council Secretary-Treasurer, and approve the surety company of which he shall be bonded..... appoint a Sergeant-at-Arms and such assistant Sergeant-at-Arms for the State Convention as are deemed necessary.


Increased Need in Eye Care Assistance

For years, the Missouri Lions Eye Research Foundation has worked closely with Knights Templar Eye Foundation (KTEF) to provide financial assistance for those in need of vision

care through its Eye Care Assistance (ECA) program. In the majority of cases, Knights Templar would cover the costs of cataracts surgery while MLERF covered pre- and postop treatment.

However, within the next six months, KTEF is going to focus its funding on research as opposed to direct care, taking with it almost \$40,000 normally allocated toward cataracts surgeries in Missouri.

This means providing assistance to the visually impaired is going to be even more critical to MLERF as the need for help continues



to grow in all areas of eye care. Already this fiscal year, MLERF has provided funding and referrals to 68 Missouri eye care patients and supplied gratis corneal tissue to 103 individuals here and around the world.

ECA Helps Kansas City Man Get Back on His Feet

Losing precious sight to an eye disease or vision condition can be a frightening and frustrating experience.

Now imagine going through those emotions without knowing how you'll be able to afford the treatment to regain your vision and control in your life. Unfortunately, this is a reality for many uninsured and underinsured Missourians who do not qualify for federal or state aid but yet cannot afford essential and needed eye care procedures.

When Gerald of Kansas City began to lose vision from detached retinas in both eyes, he didn't know where to turn. The reduced vision meant that Gerald couldn't work and couldn't drive anymore - leaving him dependent on others to accomplish daily tasks. After searching for help to afford needed treatment, Gerald was referred to MLERF's ECA program.

Shortly after completing MLERF's paperwork and speaking with its program coordinator, Gerald was accepted into the program. Just weeks later he received a special pair of glasses to correct the vision in his left eye, drastically improving his vision.

"Once I put these glasses on I could actually see the leaves and colors change. I could see so much better and clearer," he remarked.

Today, Gerald enjoys seeing the world clearly again and is thankful for his regained independence.

"I'm kind of excited about getting out into the world again," said Gerald. "It's made me excited because I can see store front signs. Before I would go to places just on instincts. I knew that two blocks down this particular store was there. People take eyesight for granted and once you lose a little bit, it's when you really appreciate things.

Lions Clubs' Donations Help Children in Need

The Missouri Lions Eye Research Foundation's Children's Vision Screening (CVS) program travels throughout the state screening children for the leading causes of blindness. However, MLERF identified that Greene County in Southwest Missouri was an area in which the need was not being met - the organization was screening only 4% of children under age 5 in comparison to 7% in the rest of Missouri.

To reach its goal of screening 6,500 in 2010/2011, MLERF would need another part-time staff member and additional screening equipment. Thanks to the Branson-Hollister



and Freistatt Lions Clubs, MLERF was able to receive both.

Past Council Chair (PCC) Howard Hawkins of Branson-Hollister encouraged his club to consider budgeting additional funds toward a new PlusOptix camera. Said PCC Howard, "One of our members told about a young man he had coached, and it was not discovered until his high school time that he had amblyopia. This young man was a very good ball player even with his sight problems. If it would have been discovered at a younger age, he might have had a better chance at a basketball career."

The club decided to provide half the funds - \$4,500 - and with the help of District Governor (DG) Debbie Whittlesey, challenged other clubs in District M-6 to provide the other half. Thankfully, PDG Bob Dieckhoff, an honorary MLERF board member, and the Freistatt Lions accepted the challenge, providing MLERF with funds to purchase the camera.

"The time and effort both of these clubs put in to make this money is great," remarked PCC Howard. "That makes it all the more meaningful to me that they would choose this project to give these extra funds. I know not all clubs have the projects to raise the kinds of funds that these clubs have, but it all adds up at the end of the year. All clubs should support our great Foundation."

Sharing the Vision 20 Ideas for Vision Service Projects

- 1. Work with local eye care professionals to organize an eye health and safety presentation.
- 2. Arrange sport and recreational activities for persons who are visually impaired, such as bowling, fishing, or swimming.
- 3. Sponsor a Braille exhibit at your local library.
- 4. Organize transportation services to medical and other appointments for persons who are blind or visually impaired.
- 5. Volunteer at a rehabilitation or vocational training center for the blind or visually impaired.
- 6. Volunteer at a recreational camp for children or adults who are blind or visually impaired. Provide campers with meals or transportation, or help with camp clean-up and repairs.
- 7. Conduct vision and diabetes screenings for elderly persons at local residential living facilities.
- 8. Encourage a parent of a blind child to enroll in free, distance education courses offered by LCI partner, The Hadley School for the Blind.
- 9. Contact the nearest Lions Eye Bank to obtain literature and donor cards. At a planned event, distribute materials to the public, encouraging them to make a pledge to donate their eyes for sight-related procedures, education and research.
- 10. Contact local schools to learn if they need aids and appliances, books and technological products for students with vision loss.
- 11. Organize a community "sight walk" to raise funds in support of your nearest Lions camp for children who are blind and visually impaired.
- 12. Arrange for a person with a guide dog to be a guest presenter at your club's community event.
- 13. Collaborate or consult with a blindness professional in an effort to educate the community (citizens, business owners, etc.) in ways they can effectively interact with a person who is blind or visually impaired.
- 14. Volunteer at a local eye bank or a Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center.
- 15. Help bring textbooks and literature to life. Volunteer to read books and periodicals for blind and visually impaired people.
- 16. Hold an educational event to promote diabetes awareness and related vision loss.
- 17. Become aware of the various vision loss/blindness resources in the community; create a resource directory and share it with parents, educators and medical professionals in your community.
- 18. To promote awareness of the common causes of vision loss and blindness, collaborate with eye care professionals to hold a community education event.
- 19. Send collected eyeglasses to the nearest Lions Eyeglass Recycling Center.
- 20. Organize a community self-help group for persons who are blind/visually impaired or for their families.

Lebanon Host Lions Hunger Campaign Project

When you live in a small town where the main manufacturing industry is making aluminum boats, it is very easy to understand the need for hunger relief in today's struggling economy. The faces of hunger can be seen on our local streets, in our markets and everywhere in town. The lack of local jobs have forced people in our community to depend on the free meals provided by different religious organizations, service groups or the different area food banks.

Our Beacon of Hope Hunger Relief project was to help the First Baptist Church of Lebanon, Missouri (U.S.A.) serve its Wednesday December 8th, 2010 evening meal to the hungry and needy people of our community. Many members of this church came early in the afternoon to prepare a warm filling meal for our hungry citizens, some of which are homeless. Five members of the Lebanon Host Lions Club helped serve the hungry citizens of our community for this evening meal. When we were through serving for the evening, each Lion member wanted to come back again soon to make a positive difference for these very needy people.

When I arrived early for my evening of service I was immediately put to work as the hours needed to prepare enough food to serve approximately 500 to 600 meals is numerous. The kitchen of the First Baptist Church was busy with pots of water boiling in preparation for cooking the large quantity of spaghetti needed for the evening meal. Ovens were full of large serving pans containing the meat sauce to cover the cooked spaghetti. Other volunteers were chopping and cutting ingredients to make the fresh salad. As the contents of large aluminum pans cooked in the ovens, they were transferred to a warming rack and additional pans were put in the oven to cook. This process was an assembly-line of food preparation by volunteers, some who have worked it before and some who were new recruits to the process. Everyone working was there to help make things a little better for their needy friends and they all realized to serve this many meals would take a lot of team work to make it happen. As all the volunteers worked non-stop they prepared about 250 meals which would be delivered to hungry residents who could not get to the church for the evening meal.

Then right on time, the hungry residents of Lebanon started to form in the serving line to get a hot cooked meal, many of which I heard say this was the only meal that they would eat all day. Five members of the Lebanon Host Lions Club would help serve over 375 meals for the evening. We served warm meals to women, children and men of our community all of whom where in desperate need of nourishment on a very cold night. Many would come back for additional plates as they were still hungry, but for this evening they could go to sleep without an empty feeling in their stomach as they each could eat until they were no longer hungry.

After we had served every hungry person who came for dinner, the members of our Lions Club were proud to have helped feed the hungry and felt a sense of contentment as we watched the hungry faces turn to smiles after they finished their dinner. This was a wonderful experience for us as Lions, we are much closer with our fellow club members, but better yet we are better known as Lions within our own community. During this event we demonstrated our Leadership and were a "Beacon of Hope" through Service to our community.
